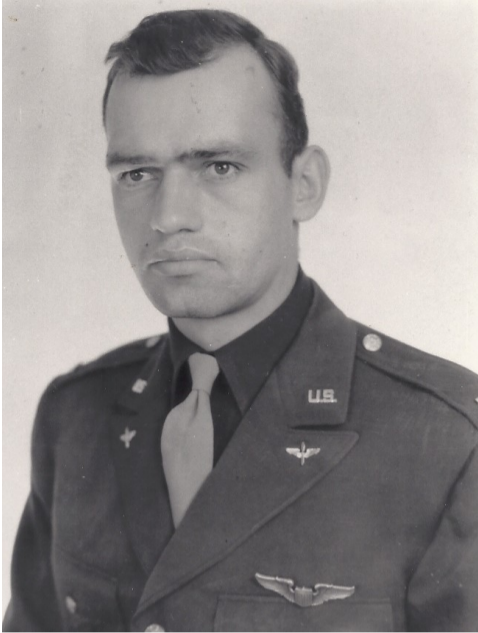

Donald Malmsten shares in 'kill'

LONDON.(AP). Lt. Donald Malmsten of Burwell, Neb., was credited with half of the kill



on an enemy plane destroyed in the air as American fighter pilots swept over the Ludwigshafen area. Lieutenant Malmsten is the son of Mr. and Mrs. C. J. Malmsten 3035 Sheridan and has been awarded the DFC.

Nebraska State Journal
26 February 1945

"About 5 miles up the tracks, I located a train and blew up the locomotive and set two box cars on fire. I then saw some trucks on a flat car and set one on fire and came around for another pass. I clobbered another truck and as I pulled up, my engine started to smoke and sounded like a hay bailer. I had only about 150 feet altitude and kept it running for about 2 minutes before it caught fire"

21 JUN 44 Participated in Operation FRANTIC II, the Russia Shuttle mission. (RTB 5 JUL)

7 AUG 44 A/C struck in the engine by flak while strafing a train near the town of Dijon, France. With his engine on fire he crash-landed in a beet field near Brazey, SSE of Dijon. Escaped the wreck with burns to his left cheek, nose and eye brows.

After walking for three days was picked up by the Underground then handed off to the Maquis, with whom he "spent a pleasant 4 weeks fishing, eating wild strawberries, etc" before returning to London on 5 September. EVD (MACR 7758)
